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Course Description

We begin with a short history of the book, how it evolved from clay tablets, through papyrus to paper. The course will focus on European methods of book-making and we also will explore other traditions for example Japanese and Coptic. Then, we will discuss the historical development of the codex and how it was actually constructed. Working hands-on, we will explore techniques of folding papers, learning about the grain of paper and boards sewing binding with tape, constructing a "case binding" and the design of book covers. We will use a variety of materials both modern and traditional throughout the course, including different types of papers, clothes, leathers, vellum, silk, linen, etc.

The student will be led through the construction of several books during the semester, utilizing different techniques; although the focus of the class is to acquire knowledge of historic book-binding, students are also encouraged to use their imagination to create their own designs and to think of book-binding as an artistic project with limitless possibilities.

The course meets once a week for a total of 4.5 hrs hours a week. Total semester contact hours are 45. Suggested credits are 3

The completion of minimum 5 examples of Book Art.

Course Outline

Week by Week Description:

- Week I Presentation of the course and tour of the workshop. Brief overview of the history of the book and book-binding. Discussing the basic techniques of book-binding and the different elements which make a book unique.
- Week II We will begin working on a variety of small simple bookbinding projects such as concertina, notebooks, "agenda". These small projects we will continue to work on throughout the semester in the midst of our more complex book-binding projects.
- Week III Overview of different types of book covers, both hard covers and soft covers. Working hands-on we will create our first book cover in the classic "half-bound" style or another design of the student's choice, using pages that are already bound.
- Week IV Compete construction of a blank book beginning with cutting the pages, folding them to arrive at 10-15 sets of 8 pages. Preparing the end-pages (first and last pages). Stitching by hand the pages to the binding tapes. Reinforcing the binding, sewing the headband and bookmark ribbon.
- *Week V* Planning and construction of the cover design building upon our first assignment. Final assembly of the cover with the internal pages.
- *Week VI* Creating a complete blank book building upon our last assignment, this time using three bands for our book-binding.



- Week VII Full bound cover in leather (or synthetic leather for students who prefer not to use animal products). Our binding will use bands in relief on the spine of the book.
- *Week VIII* Complete construction of a hard cover book using traditional Japanese book-binding techniques.
- Week IX and X We will take two weeks to create a book using a more complicated internal binding technique with two bands hidden within the cover.
- *Week XI* Finalizing our work in progress, reviewing the projects we have completed throughout the semester and preparing for the final exhibition.
- Week XII Final exhibition.

Assignments:

- 5 examples of pamphlet bindings, artwork content

- one Japanese designed drop-back box, fully lined to house experimental artwork using brush and ink
