### **ITA204 Course In Italian**

### **Italian Cultural Studies**

### **General Course Description**

The Italian Culture Course consists of 32 hours of contact time divided in two sections: *Siena in Italian History* and *Cinema Italiano*. The combined sections offers perspective on modern Italian culture on both a local and national scale. At the end of the program, students receive a final grade on their transcript that is comprehensive of coursework completed in all two sections.



# Section 1

### Exploring Siena [4-Week Intensive Course]

Instructor: Roberto Fineschi

### **Course Description**

The class is an introduction to Siena both in the past and the present. Going into origins and traditions of the medieval town, we will understand its contemporary life, its mentality and its famous public celebration: il palio. In the first part of the class, we will outline the main features of this reality. In the second part we will "see" what we learned by visiting the places where the people of Siena produced, played, prayed and lived.

### **Prerequisites**

Italian Language 101/102

### **Course Hours**

The course meets twice a week for a total of 4 hours a week.

### **Student Learning Expectations**

A deeper comprehension of the city of Siena and of its history, together with a global knowledge of medieval Italian society.

### **Course Outline**

#### Week by Week Description:

Week I In giro: Piazza del campo and its surroindings In class: general overview on medieval history.
Week II In class: Siena between myth and history.
In giro: the Duomo and its surroundings
Week III In class: Il Palio and Sienese plays I
In giro: San Francesco and Provenzano
Week IV In class: Il Palio and Sienese plays II
In giro: San Domenico and St. Catherine's house
In giro: Pantaneto and Santa Maria dei Servi

#### Assignments:

Weekly readings on the topic of the week. More material will be handed out lecture



by lecture.

# Section 2

### Course in Italian: Italian Cinema

### **Course Description**

The subject of this course is Italian Cinema. Guided screenings and discussions about Italian films will give insights into recent trends and issues in contemporary Italian society. Films are screened in the original Italian to further solidify student oral comprehension.

### **Prerequisites**

Italian Language 101/102

### **Course Hours**

Semester course meets once a week for a total of 3.5 hours a week.

### **Student Learning Expectations**

This course will allow the students to: discover important directors in Italian cinema; examine important themes in post-war Italy, improve Italian language skills.

### **Course Outline**

#### Week by Week Description:

Week I Film screening and discussion: Io non ho paura; Salvatores (2003).
Film screening and discussion: Le mine vaganti; Ozpetek (2010).
Week II Film screening and discussion: II vitelloni ; Fellini (1953).
Film screening and discussion: Lezioni di cioccolato; Cupellini (2007)
Week III Film screening and discussion: My name is Tanino; Virzì (2003)
Film screening and discussion: Manuale d'amore; Veronesi (2005).

The students will be required to complete a worksheet regarding each film and this assignment will guide group discussions.
